

Give Away That Rocking Chair!

Jane and Larry Lane Sr. '50 have recently moved into University Place in West Lafayette. One of their friends remarked to Larry that he guessed the old rocking chair would get him now. "I told him that rocking chairs weren't in the plan. How ridiculous when there is so much in today's world to explore and be excited about!" was Lane's reply. He has always loved Purdue, and it is the perfect place to retire

for a man with a lifelong fascination with the latest developments in agriculture, engineering, and the environment—to name a few. There are three Larry Lanes: in addition to Larry Sr., there is his son, Larry Lane Jr. (also a Purdue grad and Fiji brother), and his grandson, Larry Lane III, just 13 but looking forward to his days as a Boilermaker, too. The Lanes also have two other sons and a daughter.

Lane's was not a typical university experience. Like many guys of his generation, he came to Purdue after the Army where he had served for four and a half years in the Field Artillery and Tank Corps. "I actually enlisted out of high school. The rule in 1941 was that you had to be drafted, but I wasn't going to wait for that. I had already been through a lot of training and preparation in the cadet corps of ROTC at our high school. My colonel appreciated what I could do and managed to get me in," remembers Lane. He was a strapping six-foot-two and already a leader. He was excited about going overseas and seeing more action until his brother was killed. "My brother, Harold, was a radio gunner on a B-24 bomber. When the Germans brought out their new fighter planes in 1944, we lost a lot of our planes. When they were hit, he bailed

out, but his parachute didn't open. We have been to see where he is buried in France with so many others."

It was the Army's policy not to send the remaining sibling overseas. "I ended up quarding Fort Knox, not what I expected, but an interesting assignment at the time." He also began home who was serving in the Navy. When

asked how he proposed, he said, "I guess I was actually proposing from the first day I met her!" After they both left the service in 1948, they were married that July. "We went to school on the G. I. Bill. At Purdue, we lived in an Army barracks out near the airport that had been converted for families. Our first son was born in 1950. We had some great times there with the other student families."

His wasn't a typical fraternity experience either. "Bill Heath got me interested in the fraternity. We had become friends while in the artillery. When we had the initiation celebrations, my wife and baby were invited, too. So many were coming back from the war. They were eager to get on with their lives. I think some of the guys really envied me already having a wife and son." Lane eventually became the president of the student union which meant that he also managed the union building at the time. "We were really a very successful student union. I was able to get permission for my entire student board to go to the national conventions two years in a row. We learned so much and were able to do a lot of new things as a result."

When he finished at Purdue with a science degree, he took a job

with Proctor and Gamble. "It was a terrific company, but I just didn't feel I could advance quickly enough there. After two years, I took a new job with National Can Corporation." And so began a career that would first involve sales, quite a lot of public speaking, and eventually a focus on water treatment that would lead to a fascination with water that still holds him today. "Water is this country's most valuable asset. There is growing concern in many parts of the country today about how that asset is being dating Jane, a girl from managed—or perhaps not being managed at all."

> As the owner of a small farm, Lane's concern about water resources is also natural. Today he is very active in trying to find ways for the small farmers to stay in business and make a profit. "Our son, Timothy (also Fiji Purdue), put himself through dental school with money he earned raising strawberries on our farm." Today they are raising raspberries—an even more profitable crop. "We are working on ways to improve productivity and how quickly we can get such a perishable crop to market. I remember the days of the Depression when corn sold for ten cents a bushel and you got about ten bushels to an acre. It was actually better to burn it for fuel at those prices. You could get sandy land for ten dollars an acre. Nobody knew how to make it productive then. Today some of our farmers in Iowa have actually gotten 700 bushels an acre. Amazing things are happening in our university agricultural labs as new techniques are developed." Lane is looking forward to the tours of the Purdue experimental farms this September. He is definitely not looking for any rocking chairs!
