Brunches will be offered before selected home football games with undergraduates in attendance to greet returning graduates. We are encouraging interaction between undergraduates and graduates, and hoping that our graduate brothers will share in our success. Alumni **Profile** Joe Rudolph '48 Decades of Dedication to Purdue and Phi Gamma Delta

What do Jack Nicklaus and Joe Rudolph '48 have in common? No, it's nothing to do with Christmas! Both are outstanding Phi Gamma Delta graduates. Nicklaus is synonymous with golf, and Rudolph's name has been synonymous with Purdue since the 1950s. Joe Rudolph served as executive director of the Purdue Alumni Association for over 30 years.

Rudolph worked for a year and a half at Illinois Bell Telephone just out of high school before he decided that he really wanted to go to Purdue in his



father's footsteps. "I had time to gain some maturity before entering, and that stood me in good stead," remembers Rudolph. "When you pledged then, you lived in the house. We had a great senior class my freshman year. Our president was **W.A. Campbell** '**42** who was also cadet colonel in ROTC. They ran a tight ship, which we needed. I had a lot of respect for those guys."

His academic days were interrupted by World War II. After his sophomore year, he went into the service for three years. He started in preflight training for the Air Force but ended up in the Army's 16th Corps where men were needed. He saw Belgium, France and Germany. Before coming home to the United

States, he was in the 82nd Airborne Division. He returned on the Queen Mary, and what a welcome! He marched in the Victory Day Parade in New York City. He was out of the service by January 1946.

Rudolph was fortunate enough to be in touch with 15 or so of his buddies from Purdue, all of them just home. They decided to try to get back in school not easy to do, with so many young men coming back from the war trying to do the same thing. "I had a definite advantage because I already had a place to live at Phi Gamma Delta. The fraternity actually built a Quonset hut in the side yard to make room for all the brothers. As an upperclassman, I was glad to be able to live in the house," added Rudolph.

After finishing his degree in 1948, he went back to Illinois Bell, but before he left he talked to the athletic director. As a senior, he had been a student manager for the football team. Rudolph asked the director to keep him in mind if a position ever came open that might be a good fit for him at Purdue. That November the director called to tell Rudolph that the alumni organization was looking for a new field secretary. Rudolph started in April 1949 and became executive director in May 1953. He had found his calling.

It was in church one Sunday not long after he went to work for the university that he noticed Gail, who would become his wife. "I found out that she was a student and a Theta. It was fortunate that I just happened to live in a small apartment across the street from the Theta sorority house. A mutual friend introduced us," he said. The Rudolphs raised two sons and a daughter (all Purdue graduates) in the house they called home for 37 years. "We are fortunate they all still live in the area, and we get to see them often. We don't need the big house anymore though. Six years ago we built a new smaller home in West Port."

Perspective Are You Going to Flunk Retirement?

Can you flunk retirement? Many Baby Boomers have probably not given that idea much thought. Perhaps they should. Dr. Richard E. Grace '51, distinguished Fiji graduate brother who served more than 25 years as secretary of the Lambda Iota House Corporation and retired vice president for student affairs at Purdue, has written a book, "When Every Day Is Saturday: The Retirement Guide for Baby Boomers," that just might help them really enjoy a happier retirement. Faced with the prospect of retirement himself, Grace admits that he was not really prepared. He compares himself to a student who wakes up on exam day knowing he has done no homework whatsoever!

Like the engineer he is, Grace decided to look for tools to help him measure his readiness. When he found little help, he created his own — what he calls the Grace Retirement Inventory, or the GRI. He conducted an anonymous survey of nearly 2,000 retirees. The people responding, from machine operators to professors, had annual retirement incomes from \$15,000 to \$150,000. He then put together what he learned in a how-to book for planning a happy and meaningful retirement.

The book examines six common themes and ranks them in importance to retirees:

- Freedom and leisure
- Financial independence
- Separation from work
- Family and friends
- Health
- Helping others

Surprisingly, finances do not rank first. The most common concern was what to do with a 40-50-hour work week when suddenly there was no work. In general, he found that the more responsibility a person had when working, the greater the challenge adjusting to retirement. For some, retirement becomes more a burden than a benefit. Grace sees people in engineering fields today as particularly needing preparation for the possibility of retiring earlier than they expected as workforce reductions continue.

"When Every Day Is Saturday" offers questions to help readers understand their attitudes toward each of the six themes developed in the book. Numerous true-life stories give examples that are often humorous and inspiring. Using the inventory, readers can develop a detailed plan for the future.

Dick Grace and his wife, Connie, live in West Lafayette but go to Longboat Key, Fla. in the winters now. He is actively involved with the Lafayette Symphony Orchestra, and Connie volunteers at the Art Museum of Greater Lafayette.

"Freedom is the all-important feature of retirement — freedom of time and freedom of choice," notes Grace.

When he retired in 1988, Joe Rudolph had helped grow the association from 15,000 to over 65,000 members. He was instrumental in developing the John Purdue Club. Rudolph has received numerous awards, including the Leather Medal and the Distinguished Alumnus Award, for exceptional contributions to the welfare, success and reputation of Purdue University. He was selected to be a member of the Purdue Athletic Hall of Fame. Gov. Robert Orr recognized Rudolph's service with the Sagamore of the Wabash Award. Rudolph was a Fiji graduate officer for 25 years; he is especially proud of receiving the Distinguished Fiji Award.

Following retirement, he has remained active with alumni events and community efforts such as the Methodist Health Foundation in Indianapolis and the Greater Lafayette Museum of Art. He only recently left the Development Council for the Sisters of St. Joseph.

The Rudolphs have remained close friends with a group of 12-15 Fiji graduates. "It started with the fraternity. Some of us have been friends for 50 years. The guys all married Purdue girls. Every year we get together for a trip. This year we are planning to go to North Carolina; last year it was Charlottesville, Va. We all enjoy each other. When I speak to fraternity groups, I always try to impress upon them that some of the young men they know now in their pledge class will most likely be the friends they keep for the rest of their lives."

Fiji has been a part of his family for almost a century now. Rudolph's father, **Raymond R. Rudolph '14** (deceased) and both his sons, **R.F. Rudolph '77** and **John Rudolph '78**, also joined Fiji's Lambda Iota Chapter. For more than 25 years, Rudolph served as the treasurer of the Lambda Iota House Corporation and Alpha Graduate Chapter.

When asked what advice he has for young people today, Rudolph said, "First, be honest and do things in moderation. Then find something you really enjoy doing for your work. Put your whole heart and soul into it. I am grateful to say there was hardly ever a day I went to my job that I didn't go out my front door eagerly looking forward to what the day might hold."

Happenings Purdue Land Acquisition Update

The University has communicated to the members of the greek housing units in the university, Russell and Waldron Streets area that the university's needs for the property is not eminent.

According to Joe Hornett, senior vice president and treasurer of the Purdue Research Foundation, "Any organization that would be interested in Tower Acres is eligible." He also noted that the possibility of Towers Acres 2 "is an option about choice not force." No group will be required to make a new residence in the proposed Tower Acres 2 development.

At this point in time, there is not an immediate issue regarding the Phi Gamma Delta house. However, the acquisition of the land in our area is still in the university's master plan. The house corporation will continue to monitor the situation regarding the master plan and will keep the graduate brothers informed.
