

GRADUATE Q+A

Herm Brown '49, WWII Veteran and Proud Fiji, Shares His Memories and the Affect of Our Fraternity on His Life

Q. What is your hometown? When did you graduate from Purdue?

A. My hometown is Alexandria, Indiana. I was really in the class of 1950, but I went straight through in 3 years, hence I graduated in February 1949.

Q. When did you join Phi Gamma Delta? A. I pledged Fiji in 1946. Since I served in the Air Force during WWII for six years, I was a 25-year-old pledge.

Q. Why did you join the fraternity?

A. I was living in Cary Hall and roomed with Gene Stallings '50 whose brother, Bob Stallings '48, was house president. I met Bob and later was asked to pledge. At that time I didn't know much about fraternity life, but I was impressed with the house and the members and accepted the invitation. I didn't realize at the time that at 80 years old I would still be sharing a cocktail with a fraternity brother. My grandson thinks that is amazing. Of course, he is only 25.

Q. Did you live in the fraternity house? Who were your roommates?

A. I lived in the fraternity house all three years. Two roommates I remember in particular were **Bob Gerard '49** and **Mike Mikelson '49**.

Q. Do you stay in touch with anyone from your fraternity days?

A. I have stayed in contact through the years with Mike Mikelson, Larry Lane'50 and Bill Barnes '49. There were a bunch of Fijis that got together twice a year at Turkey Run. Some of those were Mitch Vogel '51, Phil Puterbaugh '50, Ray Hershman '50, Dick Sorenson '49, Dick Grace '51 and Larry Lane.

Q. What is your favorite memory of fraternity life?

A. The best memory is the brotherhood that existed. It was, and is, very special. For

years, we had what we called "The Purdue Forever Club." The members were not all Fijis but many of them were. There were probably 20 of us. Larry and Jane Lane were in this group. We sat together at the Purdue football games for many, many years. We sat through Purdue's winning years and non-winning years, through rain and yes, even snow, and cheered our team. After these games we would go to "The Oak" on Main Street in downtown Lafayette for dinner. Those are good times to remember.

The Turkey Run outings were another example of brotherhood. We not only gathered at Turkey Run State Park, but also occasionally at our homes. The last time we were together was a few years ago at our home in Alexandria. We shared this hosting with Bill and Judy Barnes, at our home on Saturday and the Barnes' home in Muncie on Sunday. Bill had a Model A coupe with a rumble seat and Bill took us for rides in it. It was a great weekend.

Q. What kind of influence did Fiji have on your life?

A. I learned how to get along with people. Living in a fraternity house with a bunch of guys, you have to get along or you will have a very unhappy experience. I'm sure it helped in my career in sales. I had to have a camaraderie with my clients to be as successful as I was. I'm sure fraternity life and living in a family with seven kids helped me in that area. It was a good experience.

Q. Tell us about your career.

A. During World War II I was a pilot and flew planes to Alaska, Africa, India and Europe on Fireball Airlines. I flew the 12th Airborne into Japan as the war ended. I have memories of my WWII flying experiences such as turning a plane around on a trip to Hawaii when we were using more fuel than normal. Our choices were going back to San Francisco or ditching into the Pacific. I caught a little heck for that when I got back to base, but I really wasn't interested in trying to swim the Pacific! Another time, I had engine trouble and made an emergency landing in Alaska. I stayed in the Reserves for 20 years and retired as a Lieutenant Colonel.

I graduated from Purdue in 1949 with a degree in mechanical engineering, and immediately after graduation I bought an insurance agency in my hometown. There went all of my engineering know-how! I gradually enlarged the insurance company and soon added real estate to the business. I had four offices in Alexandria, Anderson,

Middletown and Muncie, Indiana. I was the number one real estate company in Madison County for eight years. After 40 years, my son took over the insurance company and I sold the real estate company.



Q. Tell us about your family. Married? Children?

A. I married a town girl, Roselynn Burkhardt, and May 19 we will celebrate our 55th anniversary. We have two children and three grandsons. Our son, Lon, is a Purdue graduate, as is his wife Margie. The Fijis let a good one get away as Lon is an Acacia and was very involved in their sports program. His wife is a Kappa. Lon has turned our insurance company into the 25th largest in the state of Indiana. Our daughter, Connie Niessink, is also a Purdue graduate, as is her husband Tom. Connie is Gamma Phi Beta and was a Purdue cheerleader and was squad captain her senior year. Tom is an Acacia, too, like my son. Fijis missed a good one there too, but I guess they can't expect to get all the good guys. Connie owns and manages the Niessink Commercial Real Estate Company in Indianapolis.

Q. Tell us about some of your civic activities.

A. A very special award I received was the Purdue Alumni Citizenship Award in 1990. I am proud of that one. Also I was a member of Senator Richard Lugar's Air Force Academy Merit Selection Committee for 20 years. Some other activities include:

- Member of the Board of Directors of the Madison County Purdue Club
- Many positions in the Lutheran Church of Our Blessed Savior
