

Brian Lamb '63 Receives Presidential Medal of Freedom

Lambda Iota Graduate Brother One of Eight Awarded by President Bush

In November 2007, **Brian Lamb '63** was awarded a Presidential Medal of Freedom by George W. Bush. Lamb was one of eight recipients of this honor, which is the nation's most prestigious civilian award.

President Bush selected Brian as one of eight people "who has made an especially meritorious contribution to the security or national interests of the United States, or world peace, or cultural or other significant public or private endeavors," according to the award criteria. Other honorees include Harper

Lee (author of "To Kill a Mockingbird") and Benjamin Hooks (former executive director of the NAACP).

Specifically, Brian was chosen due to his "dedication to a transparent political system and to the free flow of ideas," as the founder and CEO of C-SPAN, which broadcasts daily congressional proceedings on cable and the internet. Brian founded the network in 1979 after spending years in the Lafayette television and radio markets. Today, C-Span reaches more than 85 million households.

Brian has received further prestigious recognition in recent years, including the National Humanities Medal in 2003 and induction into the Indiana Broadcast Pioneers Hall of Fame in 2005.

Tom Spurgeon '61 Donates \$3 Million to Mackey Arena Renovation Project Gift Culminates His Years of Support of Purdue University

We would like to recognize graduate brother Tom Spurgeon '61, who recently donated \$3 million to the project to renovate and expand Mackey Arena on Purdue's campus. Tom has been a long time supporter of Purdue, serving on the University's Board of Trustees and contributing to past campus facility renovations, including the Tom Spurgeon Golf Training Center. He also served on the steering committee of Purdue's \$1.7 billion

capital campaign, which ended last year.

The arena's renovations are planned to be completed before the 2011-2012 basketball

season. The athletic and classroom facilities will be expanded, and the seating and ticket offices will be renovated as well.

Tom leads the way among other Purdue alumni who have contributed to this project. Phi Delta Theta alumnus Bob Holloway contributed \$2 million to the project, and five other University alumni have contributed \$1 million each.

Purdue's Hanley Hall Named After Lambda lota Graduate and Wife

Couple Donates \$3 Million to Consumer and Family Sciences Building Project

William G. Hanley '60 and his wife Sally will have a building named for them on the Purdue campus. The \$11.5 million building, will serve the academic needs of the growing College of Consumer and Family Sciences. The Bill and Sally Hanley Hall will house programs focused on early childhood education, child development, aging and family research with a focus on military families.

The couple contributed \$3 million to the project.

"A high quality of life through all of life's stages is perhaps the greatest gift we could hope to contribute toward," Sally said.

"This building presented the perfect

opportunity for us to extend our giving at Purdue," Bill Hanley added, according to a Purdue University press release. "Sally and her twin sister, Sue Berner Eibel, had a playschool at the family home during their college summers. Sally taught first and second grades. She also believes firmly in spending time with and supporting older people. Sally has volunteered with Mobile Meals both as a coordinator and driver."

The Hanleys received a silver shovel with their names engraved at the building's preconstruction celebration in October.

"We want to give back to the communities and institutions that made us who we are," said Bill. "Boiler up!"

Former Student-Athlete Don Albert '55 Inducted Into Purdue Hall of Fame

In late 2007, **Don Albert '55** was inducted into the Purdue Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame for his success as a Boilermaker golfer in the early to mid 1950's. During his career at Purdue, he won the Big Ten individual championship in both 1953 and 1954, and played in the 1953 U.S. Open and other PGA events. Receiving letters in all four years on the team, he led the undefeated 1955 squad as captain. Don was one of nine former student-athletes from Purdue inducted into the Hall of Fame last year.

Leadership and Service to the Community are Qualities that Stacy Lankford '70 Attributes to His Days at Phi Gamma Delta

A Fortune Magazine Article May be One of the Highlights of His Days at Purdue

Stacy Lankford '70 began his life of leadership and service as a member of Phi Gamma Delta at Purdue. Growing up in a small, rural town in Indiana, attending Purdue was a life-changing time for Stacy. His experiences at Purdue and Fiji gave him the self-confidence and the opportunities to serve and promote leadership.

Stacy was recently installed as the chair of the Federation of State Medical Boards in May of 2007. Elected to this position, Stacy will preside over meetings of the board of directors and provide leadership in governing the national organization that represents the 70 state medical boards of the United States and its territories.

Over the years, Stacy has had a distinguished record of service to Indiana's medical community. He was appointed to the Medical Licensing Board of Indiana in 1992 and served for three terms. Becoming involved in the national organization, Stacy also served on a number of committees and offices on the board of directors. He also served as Treasurer and Vice-chair of the Federation of State Medical Boards.

Stacy believes that being a member of Phi Gamma Delta was the influence that led him to these roles in his life. Being a bit cautious about joining a fraternity, Stacy didn't pledge Fiji until his sophomore year. He decided to join Phi Gamma Delta because the reputations of other fraternities on campus were not as positive. Stacy's goals were to keep a good GPA and to join a fraternity with an atmosphere and culture that allowed its members to succeed academically, and he felt that Fiji would help him with these goals and he has never looked back.

Phi Gamma Delta did provide Stacy with the atmosphere that he so desired. He became a self-confident young man, and even though he started a year later than most, with his associations at the fraternity, he ran for president and he was elected. One of the projects that Stacy led after joining Fiji was a cultural diversity day on campus for high school students. Attending college shortly after the civil rights bill was passed, Stacy conceived the idea and led the project with the help of others who had similar interests. Through focused campaigning, Stacy produced a very successful event for the students and thus continued to hone his leadership skills and self-confidence.

One of the experiences that Stacy best remembers is the city of West Lafayette's response to civil rights. During the time that Stacy was attending Purdue, the city of West Lafayette was developing a Human Relations Commission and only the citizens of Lafayette were invited to provide their input. Since the students at Purdue were such a large part of the city, the students also wanted their input to be included.

The students had something to offer and wanted to get involved. His speech was so controversial that he brought the mayor's wife to tears. Stacy did make an impact. In fact, based on that speech, there was an article about him published in *Fortune* magazine titled "Mr. Lankford Talks Back." He was flown to New York City and even met the editor of *Time* magazine.

Stacy graduated in 1970 with a pharmacy degree and then continued his education and went to medical school. During pharmacy school, Stacy met his wife Zane. They are happily married and have three children; Garrick, Brent, and Carmen. They also have two grandchildren who they get to see very often.

A number of Stacy's pledge Brothers still keep in contact with each other. Stacy and Zane live on Diamond Lake near **Bill Mattingly** and they also stay in touch with **Al Shikany** '70, who was the best man at his wedding.

Stacy feels that if he didn't become a member of Phi Gamma Delta and have the opportunity to grow as a person, he may not have advanced as far in life as he had. He is very grateful for what he learned, the people he met, and the opportunities for leadership and service that Phi Gamma Delta presented.
