Lambda Iota Initiates Purdue President

Graduates & Undergraduates Welcome Purdue President Mitch Daniels Into Our Brotherhood

For eight years, we called him "Governor." For the past three years, we have called him "President." And in 2013, we added a title to the résumé of **Mitchell E. Daniels, Jr.**: "Brother." The son of Allegheny Phi Gam Mitchell E. Daniels, Sr. '44, Brother Daniels graduated in 1971 from Princeton where student social life is built around eating clubs, not fraternities or sororities.

In a private ceremony on October 15, 2013, the brothers of Lambda Iota formally initiated President Daniels into Phi Gamma Delta at Purdue. Several esteemed guests were in attendance. We welcome this esteemed graduate brother and would like to share a few words from him about this experience.

What does this new membership in Phi Gamma Delta mean to you?

It was, first of all, a way to honor my late father, who was a loyal Fiji his entire life. Had I attended a school with Greek fraternities, there is little doubt I would have been a Fiji four decades ago.

What do you see in Phi Gamma Delta that you wish you would have had during your days at Princeton?

I enjoyed the camaraderie at our eating club, but not the explicit value system or sense of shared purpose that I find at Phi Gamma Delta.

What do you see in Phi Gamma Delta that you would like to see in all Purdue chapters?

Our chapter is an academic leader, setting a great standard for other fraternities to try to match.

How would you describe the current state of the Greek community at Purdue?

It is strong, one of the nation's largest, and with very limited occasional exceptions, a model of good student citizenship. The system polices its own members actively and effectively. Their members continue to play a central, disproportionate

role in the life of the campus and in the overall success record of our alumni.

What else would you like your Phi Gamma Delta graduate brothers to know about you?

I still have my Dad's pin (Allegheny '44) and was initiated with that same pin.

We extend our congratulations to President (and Brother) Daniels and look forward to seeing him at future Phi Gamma Delta events as part of our Lambda Iota brotherhood.

GRADUATE SPOTLIGHT

Former MLB Team President Gives All the Credit to Fiji Brother Chuck Armstrong '64 on What is Good & Right About Phi Gamma Delta



We all have them — keepsakes and heirlooms handed down from parents, grandparents or others who not only wanted to ensure their safekeeping, but also to pass on their significance and related

stories. For Fiji Brother **Chuck Armstrong** '64, he has been fortunate to pass on a few timeless traditions to other generations: Phi Gamma Delta and Major League Baseball.

"Lambda Iota Chapter of Phi Gamma Delta perhaps had the greatest influence on my life of anything I have ever experienced," he explains. "The quality of the brothers and their complete and accepting friendship provided me with much guidance and mentorship, both during my days at Purdue and continuing down to today. I believe that my best leadership experiences came about because of and through the fraternity."

Chuck's fondest Fiji memories come from being part of a quality organization with brothers like **Joe Rudolph '48**, **Dick Grace '51** and **Dave Jones '59** who were always available to give him the wise advice and counsel he needed. He can look back on being part of something that stood for so much more than just a social club. "Phi Gamma Delta, on both the local and national levels, has always stood for all that is good and right about college fraternities. And whenever there were the inevitable veers, strong corrective measures have always been instituted to bring our fraternity back to the proper course."

Following his graduation from Purdue, Chuck went to law school at Stanford University. After law school, he served three and one-half years on active duty in the U.S. Navy as a line officer, most of the time on an attack aircraft carrier where he qualified as officer-of-the-deck for Formation Steaming and Flight Operations — one of his proudest achievements. In 1971, he was hired by a UCLA Fiji brother to join a downtown Los Angeles law firm where he practiced corporate and business law until 1977. He then took a leave of absence from the law firm to join a client, a furniture manufacturer and importer, as its president and chief operating officer.

After three years of almost constant travel, Chuck next joined an Orange County real estate development company as president/ CEO of its asset management subsidiary and general legal counsel of the parent company. The owner of the company bought the Seattle Mariners in February 1981. In October 1983, Chuck moved his family to Seattle where he was made president/chief operating officer of the Mariners. He served in that capacity until they sold the team in October 1989. During the ensuing two and one-half years, he served as the interim athletic director at the University of Washington, officed at two law firms and helped put together a group of investors who bought the Mariners back in July 1992. He was again made president of the team.

"Being president of a major league baseball team is like being in charge of a very emotional public trust in which thousands of people have put their faith and hope. It is 24/7/365 — an awesome responsibility. My only regret is that in 28 years as president of the Seattle Mariners, we never made the World Series. However, some of my greatest successes also came during this time, including helping to save major league baseball for Seattle, getting a beautiful new ballpark built, Safeco Field, and putting together an

organization whose culture has always been to epitomize all that is good and right about professional athletics. I am so grateful to have been part of Major League Baseball — one of the few activities in North America which transcends generations."

Chuck retired from the Seattle Mariners on January 31, 2014. Today, Chuck remains active with Lambda Iota, helping to ensure the integrity of the chapter and house for future generations. He is also able to spend more time with his wife of 48 years, Susan, their three children and four grandchildren.

Chuck has a few words of advice for his younger Fiji brothers: "Every successful professional sports team has three basic rules that should be incorporated into everyone's daily life. 1) Work hard. 2) Have respect. 3) Be early. When Vince Lombardi coached the Green Bay Packers, he had a rule that if you were not at least 15 minutes early, you were

DISTINGUISHED FIJI AWARD

Pig Dinner Speaker Gives Nod to Exceptional '56-'57 Pledge Class Brother Tom Spurgeon '61 Next in Line to Achieve Distinguished Fiji Award



He was the first person in his family to attend college. This meant that on his first day at Purdue, Tom Spurgeon '61 had very little understanding of fraternities and the Greek system. However, on that

day in 1957 when he pledged Phi Gamma Delta at Purdue, Tom would become part of something special — a collegiate experience that would give him and his highly accomplished pledge class a unique sense of unity, pride and consideration of others.

"We did a good job of helping each other through school," Tom explains. "We had certain ideals of a conservative nature. The Phi Gams who went before were very capable people. When I was a freshman, there was a senior everyone looked up to — Gene Cernan '56. He was the last man to walk on the moon. We all had a mutual adherence to standards and ethics, and it rubbed off on everybody. And it was especially helpful in forming the successes of future leaders."

Tom has his own story of accomplishment. Following his 1961 Purdue graduation in industrial management, he transitioned from ROTC to a full officer Army commission. He ultimately was transferred to the Department of Defense where he joined the Defense Atomic Support Agency as a nuclear weapons officer. One of a select number of officers assigned to this position, Tom was responsible for maintaining warheads as assigned.

In 1964, following his military service, Tom returned to school at Indiana University where he would earn an MBA. As his professional bio reads, he is "an entrepreneur who has built companies

throughout the United States. Mr. Spurgeon most recently served as President and Chief Executive Officer of Lincoln Office in Peoria, Illinois, one of the country's largest distributors of Steelcase furniture. During his business career, he has served on four additional corporate boards and various community boards. Presently, he is on two corporate boards, he is a hospital Trustee, and Vice Chairman (former Chair) of the Board of Trustees of Purdue University. His service to Purdue includes membership on the Campaign for Purdue steering committee and Purdue Athletic Advisory Council. He also has served on the executive committee of the PAA Board of Directors and chaired its Strategic Planning Task Force. Mr. Spurgeon has served on the advisory board for the Indiana University School of Business and as an instructor at both Indiana University and Bradley University."

"I've been fortunate," Tom admits. "If we go back to 1985, I had one of my most significant learning experiences. While running Gott Corp., I was hit head-on on the interstate and suffered severe head injuries. My wife was told that I didn't make it. Three days later, the board was told that I would never work again. I was back in six months. This whole event helped me quickly identify the things that were most important to me, including spending more time with my family."

Earlier this year, Tom was named a 2014 winner of the Distinguished Fiji Award. As described in the spring 2015 issue of *The Phi Gamma Delta*, the "Archons established the Distinguished Fiji Award in 1964. It is presented annually to no more than six graduate brothers who are deserving of recognition for their faithful and unselfish service to Phi Gamma Delta or their special contribution to mankind and society at large."

2014 Pig Dinner

In the fall of 2014, Tom was asked to address his Lambda Iota brotherhood as the keynote speaker at the chapter's annual Pig Dinner. "When Brother Bill Miller contacted me about speaking, I was somewhat surprised," Tom explains. "I don't think of myself as extraordinary when it comes to Phi Gamma Delta. But I have attempted to stay in touch with my pledge brothers over time. Of my 15 pledge brothers, I was least likely to succeed. I am very proud of how unique our pledge class was in their accomplishments."

In his address to those attending the 2014 Pig Dinner, Tom went on to highlight the successes of those '57 pledge brothers who joined him during those most important undergraduate years. For example:

Student Center Renamed to Honor Brother Bruce Pitman '71

It used to be, when a new semester began at the University of Idaho, Bruce Pitman (Purdue 1971) would give out his home phone number to the parents of

incoming freshmen at the end of every parent orientation so they could have access to him after hours.

When the fall semester of 2014 came to an end, Brother Pitman began a new chapter



of life after serving the University for 41 years, mostly recently as dean of students and vice provost of student affairs.

In honor of his retirement and selfless service, the Idaho State Board of Education renamed UI's Student Union Building The Pitman Center.

Throughout Bruce's tenure, he tackled tough issues to

make life better for the students. Some of those issues included tragedy, death, health, campus safety, mental illness and sexual assault. Across the campus, he especially worked to reduce student drug and alcohol use, all with support from his wife, Kathy.

An additional honor for the couple has been development of the endowed Bruce & Kathy Pitman Student Success Fund, which will provide the dean of students with annual, unrestricted funds to support students.

In Phi Gamma Delta, Bruce served his Lambda Iota Chapter as president and then traveled Fijiland as a Field Secretary from 1971-73. He has also served as a Section Chief, as a member of the Board of Chapter Advisors at Idaho, and as an Archon Councilor from 2010-24.

State of the Chapter ... 37 Semesters in the Top 10!

- For the third semester in a row, Lambda lota has just missed first place by 1/100th of a percentage point in semester GPA rankings among 41 IFC chapters. They outperformed the all-university, all-fraternity/sorority and all-men's average GPAs for spring 2015. The average GPA for the 35 undergraduates from PC18 was 3.16, well above the 2.90 all-IFC average. The cumulative GPA at the end of the last academic year was 3.16.
- Over the past two fall semesters, our undergraduates have been co-hosts of the Theta Fiji Grill-Off, one of the Greek system's most successful philanthropies

- at Purdue. The chapter also has several brothers involved with Purdue's largest student-run organizational on campus, the Purdue University Dance Marathon.
